Message from our Principal, Miss Thomas



Dear Parents and Carers,

First of all apologies for the delayed production of this newsletter, COVID has affected us in this also!

That aside, we again have plenty to celebrate with you, our parents, carers and stakeholders. Pupils have been able to engage in a broader range of experiential opportunities this term. We have been able to travel further and to get back to doing some things we really enjoy, for example swimming lessons have started for younger classes.

This is really important to us, as it means we can restart trips across the local area, now that we are able to go further afield. This is an essential way of bringing the curriculum to life and gives our pupils 'real' learning activities which enrich and extend children's learning. You can read more about what the pupils have been able to do on pages 8 and 16. One thing we are very pleased about is our pupil's comportment and attitude on trips. We can say wholeheartedly that every single member of the WKS team has joined in, been polite, listened, shared ideas and been a credit to the school. Well done to all!

This makes us exceptionally proud of our young people.

Reading remains another key focus for us. We have a number of key strategies to support our young people in developing all the key reading skills.

This includes:

- Learning all the letter sounds (e.g. c and k sound the same when you read them)
- Learning all the letter blends (e.g. 'co' sounds like a c in cold, in cordial, in corduroy, but in 'ci' it sounds like s - e.g. in circus, in circle, in circuit, in circumstance.)
- Learning what inference is, how to 'read between the lines', to understand what the author is saying and to learn how to analyse a text
- Learning technical language (e.g. what is a stanza, a rhyming couplet, an iambic pentameter)
- Learning how to enjoy reading, to take part and share books, comics, magazines and other reading materials

So, why not ask your child to join you in making a cuppa and sitting down to read this newsletter together?

We hope you enjoy it.

the refreshments; and to all the parents, carers and families who joined us to support the pupils.


























World Book Day


















Author Illustrator visit

Are you Going for Gold?


Going for Gold is the reward scheme at West Kirby School. It focuses on our pupils' positive behaviours and attitudes across the school day.

Animal Care update

Our Animal Care department, new since September, is part of the vocational curriculum on offer in our school. We're pleased to see it is already a successful addition and growing quickly.

Update from Miss Hitchmough, Animal Care Technician

Our hens are finally laying, with most of the eggs being donated to Food Technology and Nurture; so our students have the opportunity to use them practically and taste the eggs from the hens they have helped rear. A taste test was done with Class 8JBA, Mr Musgrave and Miss Thomas, who compared store bought eggs to ours when scrambled. The outcome? Ours were much more yellow and were more flavourful.

Our Maintenance team have also built fantastic new runs for our rabbits and guinea pigs.

New animal introductions

We now have three new reptiles and one new invertebrate at the school including:

Gible the Bearded Dragon, kindly donated by Dragonmorphs.co.uk. He is a juvenile dragon who is full of energy and keen to be hand fed by the students. He will grow up to 2ft eventually so it will be nice for the students to see him develop.

Gordon the Crested Gecko (flame morph with dalmatian spotting) who is 2 years old, collected from Askham Bryan College. Gordon is fully grown and loves to do the leap of faith, his sticky hands and feet allow him to stick to all surfaces in the enclosure. He is a little trickier to handle which gives the students targets to aim for and enables















them to learn how to handle different animals appropriately.

Igglybuff (Iggy) a female Leopard Gecko, kindly donated by Miss Woolley to the Animal Department. She is sweet in nature and enjoys being handled by staff and students alike, a firm favourite amongst everyone who meets her.

Black Beauty Stick Insects have been kindly donated to the school from Calderdale College. They are critically endangered in Peru and collections such as our own are helping increase numbers and help prevent extinction. A great opportunity for the students to be involved in a world wide conservation project.

Neurodiversity activities & news

This term has been a busy one with Neurodiversity Celebration Week, Autism Awareness and our Autism Accreditation visits, which continuously develop our Autism support in classrooms and around school.

We joined the National campaign 'Neurodiversity Celebration Week' to raise awareness and understanding of neurodiversity. Our classes and subjects across school focused on:

- Understanding what neurodiversity means
- Looking at celebrities and successful people who are neurodivergent
 - Celebrating strengths and talents

We've welcomed Jonny Knowles, National Autistic Society, who visited us as part our Autism Accreditation. Led by Miss Spence, we're continually assessing any improvements to be ASC friendly.

Recently we've focused on communication; reviewing and improving strategies in place to support independence, including classroom visuals and strategies, wayfinding signage







and installed suggestion boxes for pupils to express choice for lunches and ideas for school improvement.

Next term we're seeking pupils' views to develop this further.

The Story of Davey the Dove

Shared by Miss Hitchmough.....

A collared dove flew into the glass pane on one of Mr Davey's windows during a 8JBA Maths class, making a huge thud. Miss Young reported it to Miss Hitchmough.

Together with a student Tyler, wearing PPE, they collected the dove into a pet carrier where they gave the bird a health check, some water and food. There was no obvious breakage to the wings, but they took the dove to the vet. The vet weighed the dove (71g) who was male and said that there were no breaks, it had been attacked by another bird which must have been why it flew into the window and lost so many feathers. Pain relief and some vital fluids were given to the dove and were instructed to keep the dove in an enclosure until it showed the ability to fly.





It was decided to call the dove 'Davey,' after Mr Davey. The next day Davey displayed the ability of flight, so with the supervision of Miss Hitchmough, Myla, our student Environmental Ambassador. released Davey back into the 'wild' and he flew straight up into the tree behind the polytunnel and

Year 10 pupils took a trip to Blue Planet Aquarium to collect research for their 'Under the Water' themed work, pupils really enjoyed seeing the range of fish on display and took lots of photos to work from.

Year 11s visited the Van Gogh Immersive Exhibition at Salford Quays. The experience was mesmerising and all enjoyed it. The visit inspired artwork produced back in school.

Year 12s and 13s visited the Open Eye Gallery in Liverpool. They were given a tour by the gallery's Education Officer, who discussed in detail the photography work on display and the inspiration behind it.

Pathfinders news

We have welcomed three new pupils into Pathfinders and enjoyed getting to know them.

This term Pathfinders have read 'Where the Wild Things Are', by Maurice Sendak. We have also worked hard on improving our handwriting. In Maths our topics have included statistics and in Science we did lots of activites linked to sound.

In 'Learning Means the World', we have looked at 'Paddington's Passport', where we found out about continents and oceans, compared capital cities and then created our own passports. In 'Land Ahoy' we learnt pirate songs and dances, we identified features on a treasure map, and then completed a DT Project to build pirate ship that floats.
